
A Weekend Update from Holland Moor- Saturday April 24th

We always seem to have our very best weeks when the weather is as beautiful as it has been over the last few days. It's been great to see some of the sports clubs back on the school field. Year 6 certainly enjoyed the return of swimming lessons. We should be able to use the full range of play equipment soon. It's a longer email this week but I want all parents, carers and friends of the school to know about our exciting curriculum.

What's going on in lessons this half-term?



In Nursery 2 the children are studying life cycles. They have looked at, and sequenced, the life cycle of a chicken and have planted a sunflower seed. The children will observe the seed and see how it grows in the coming weeks. The class are listening to Jack and the Beanstalk and focusing on describing the characters and the growth of the beanstalk. Alongside this, in phonics the children are practising making different sounds with their voices and studying how our voices and mouth shape changes when making the different sounds.

N3 children are learning about growth and change. They have been talking about the life stages of a chicken and planted sunflower seeds. The children will water the seeds and wait to see what happens. In the next few weeks the class will observe caterpillars closely and talk about how they look and how they change. It's a lovely time of year to be in Nursery. There will be lots of opportunities to learn some new action songs and rhymes too. Maybe involve the children in a little gardening at home if the opportunity arises.

Our reception classes have daily phonics sessions concentrating on single letter sounds and will then move on to trickier sounds with two or more letters. The children will be blending sounds to write words and working to build up simple sentences usually based around an engaging story. Children take part in a class reading session every day, a guided read in their group and a read with an adult each week too. In maths the classes explore a different number weekly and on Friday children take part in lots of hands-on maths activities like measuring and weighing. The children have a PE lesson every Friday and also get creative with arts and crafts

KS1 children are enjoying learning about castles and how they have changed over time. Their Science lessons are based on animals, including humans, with a focus on senses, good health and growth. The PSHE topic includes valuing differences, where the children are learning how to be kind to all their friends, family and other people in their lives. Our art is based on houses around the world.

The children in Year 3 and Year 4 will be using the books 'I Survived the Sinking of the Titanic' by Lauren Tarshis and 'Tragedy at Sea' by David Long. The children will be given a ticket to board the Titanic, and are already discussing which travel class they hope to find in their envelope. The class novel is 'Sky Song' by Abi Elphinstone,' a truly charming book set in the snowy, fantasy kingdom of Erkenwald, where nothing is what it seems. The children are learning about rivers in Geography before they move on to studying the local area (History and Geography combined). In Science lessons we will complete the Sound and How We Hear topic before moving on to Habitats.

Children in years 5 and 6 will be finishing off our current DT topic of celebrating culture and seasonality with a DT day. They will make, design and evaluate their own biscuit; not forgetting the all-important tasting of their product. King Kong will be the next novel we use in English. The children will be using a range of grammatical features when writing newspaper reports, diary entries and undertaking slow writes. In RE we will be starting our new topic of Humanism. Science will see the children begin to learn about living things and their habitats. In this topic, the children's focus will be on exploring, observing, grouping and classifying.


